# "Scotland's Future" Scottish Government White Paper on Independence: Third Sector and Civic Society

On 18 September 2014 there will be a referendum in which voters will be asked the question, "Should Scotland be an independent country?", and the Scotlish Government has produced a White Paper to explain its proposals for the way in which an independent Scotland would be governed.

A White Paper is a document produced by the Government that sets out details of their proposed future policy on a particular subject. It is not a consultation and does not set out alternatives, but only gives details of the Government's intentions. This White Paper does not, therefore, provide an analysis of the advantages and disadvantages of Scotland becoming an independent country, and it does not discuss what should happen if Scotland remains in the UK.

### What are "Civic Society" and the "Third Sector"?

The terms "Civic Society" and "Third Sector" are often used interchangeably, to refer to organisations that are not part of government, and are not a business. They include organisations that represent the interests and values of different sectors in society, such as representative bodies of minority ethnic communities, faith communities, disabled people, the LGBT community, as well as social enterprise and other not-for-profit organisations that provide a range of services to the community, often with the help of a large number of volunteers. Some, but not all of these organisations are registered charities.

#### The Scottish Government's relationship with Civic Society and the Third Sector

The White Paper proposes that, if Scotland were to become an independent country, laws would be introduced during the transition period to require the first Scottish Parliament in an independent Scotland to convene a Constitutional Convention, to consult on, debate, and draft a written consultation. The Scottish Government believes that Civic Society organisations enable the voices of Scotland's diverse communities to be heard in public debates, and therefore proposes that the Constitutional Convention would involve not only politicians, but also civic society organisations, together with business interests, trade unions, local authorities, and others.

The Scottish Government believes that the Third Sector plays a key role in supporting Scotland's diverse communities and in the delivery of public services, and has said that, if Scotland were to become an independent country, it would be committed to supporting the development of a "capable, sustainable and enterprising Third Sector".

#### Charities

Although the regulation of charities is already devolved – that is, decisions are made by the Scottish and not the UK Parliament – responsibility for matters affecting charities such as corporation tax exemptions and reliefs, and Gift Aid, are reserved to the UK Parliament.

The Scottish Government proposes that if Scotland were to become an independent country:

- the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator would continue to liaise with the Charity Commission, which regulates charities throughout the rest of the UK, to ensure that there is effective but not onerous regulation for charities that operate in both jurisdictions;
- The Scottish Government would review tax policy, and consider changes that would encourage more people to donate to charities.
