**Dr Richard Simpson** (Mid Scotland and Fife) (Lab): To ask the Scotlish Executive whether it has discussed or will discuss with the UK Government the possibility of taking over health service provision at Dungavel Immigration Removal Centre. (S3W-37155)

**Reply from Nicola Sturgeon:** The Scottish Government is facilitating the discussions of UK Government with NHS Lanarkshire, in this reserved area, regarding the responsibility for the delivery of primary care services to the residents of Dungavel. Specialist healthcare is currently delivered by NHS Lanarkshire.

### **Holyrood Parliamentary Motion**

**S3M-7374 Sandra White: Concern over Relocation of Asylum Seekers**—That the Parliament notes with serious concern the decision by the UK Border Agency (UKBA) to terminate its accommodation contract with Glasgow City Council, which could lead to the forced relocation of over a thousand asylum seekers to anywhere in Scotland; criticises the UKBA for the apparent suddenness of its communication and lack of clarity contained

within, which is believed to have led to great uncertainty and anxiety not only among those in Glasgow but also the local integration networks and housing providers; believes that the UKBA policies that state that "whenever possible you will be given at least three to five days' notice of the move" and that "you will (only) be allowed to take two pieces of luggage per person to your new accommodation" are directly opposed to the basic rights that many have fought for and more aligned with the injustices that many have fought against, and would welcome alternative proposals being brought forward.

### **Westminster Parliamentary Questions**

#### Migration

**Lord Taylor of Warwick:** To ask Her Majesty's Government what is their assessment of the impact of the immigration cap on cancer research.[HL3584]

Reply from the Minister of State, Home Office (Baroness Neville-Jones): The Government believe that Britain can benefit from migration but not uncontrolled migration. We have always been clear that we will continue to allow the brightest and the best to come to the UK, including the world class researchers who play such an important role in cancer research. Controlling migration is very much about attracting the best, and the two aims are not incompatible.

#### **Immigration Controls**

**Alun Cairns:** To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department what mechanisms are in place to ensure that the immigration cap does not adversely affect the capacity of companies to recruit staff from outside the EU with skills not available from the UK workforce; and if she will make a statement. [22227]

**Reply from Damian Green:** Under the current interim limit, we are monitoring each sponsoring employer's allocations closely and reviewing them as appropriate. Employers can request to sponsor additional migrant workers above their allocation. On 1 November, the UK Border Agency published refined criteria for handling these requests, to give employers greater certainty.

Regarding the full limit that will be introduced from next year, the Government carried out a full public consultation over the summer and are assessing the responses.

#### **Immigration Controls**

**David Blunkett:** To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department which (a) intercompany transfers and (b) student visas she plans to exempt from the proposed cap on levels of non-EU immigration; for what reasons the exemptions have been made; and if she will make a statement. [23120]

**Reply from Damian Green:** We will announce the operation of the immigration limit and precise details of how in future individual routes will work in due course. As the Prime Minister said last week, businesses have told us that intra-company transfers should not be part of the annual limit. We have listened carefully to the advice.

Our limit applies to economic routes. We are reviewing the non-economic immigration routes separately, including the student route. We will introduce new measures, where required, to minimise abuse of the student route and tighten the system further, in support of the aim of reducing net migration to tens of thousands rather than hundreds of thousands.

#### **Immigration Controls: English Language**

**Andrew Turner:** To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department what account her Department takes of the proficiency in English of the (a) spouses and (b) dependants of applicants for (i) British citizenship, (ii) leave to remain and (iii) asylum in determining the outcome of such applications. [22565]

**Reply from Damian Green:** Those applying for naturalisation as a British citizen are expected to demonstrate that they have sufficient knowledge of English and of life in the United Kingdom. Those applying for citizenship through registration routes, which include children under 18, do not have to meet this requirement.

Those applying for settlement also need to demonstrate the knowledge of life requirement unless they are applying under a category for which this is not required.

A person can show that he or she meets this requirement by either passing a citizenship test, or attending a course which teaches English for Speakers of other Languages using citizenship-based materials. The proficiency in English of a person's spouse and dependents are not taken into account when considering an application, although if they wish to apply for citizenship in their own right they will need to demonstrate that they meet this requirement.

From 29 November 2010 we will require those applying to come to or stay in the UK as the spouse or partner of a British citizen or person settled here to meet an English language requirement.

For citizenship, settlement, and applying for entry as a spouse or partner there are exemptions to the language requirement, such as where the person has a mental or physical condition which would make it unreasonable to expect them to learn English or is aged 65 or over.

For spouses and dependants applying for leave to remain under the points based system routes, there is no English language requirement.

Similarly there is no English language requirement for spouses or dependants of refugees who want to join them in the UK.

#### **People Trafficking**

Lord Hunt of Kings Heath: To ask Her Majesty's Government what measures are in place to ensure that multi-agency child safeguarding teams operate at main United Kingdom ports to identify and respond to concerns about children and young people arriving in or leaving the United Kingdom.[HL2989]

Reply from the Minister of State, Home Office (Baroness Neville-Jones): The Government are committed to safeguarding children. Multi-agency arrangements for child safeguarding operate at all ports and UK border force staff receive training on how to identify safeguarding concerns, how to respond to such

situations and how to refer their concerns to the statutory agencies that have a child protection or child welfare role.

**Lord Hylton:** To ask Her Majesty's Government which local authorities provide an independent reviewer in all cases where it is suspected or alleged that a child has been trafficked.[HL3065]

Reply from the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Schools (Lord Hill of Oareford): Potentially trafficked children are likely to present to local authorities as unaccompanied asylum seeking children (UASC). They will be supported as looked-after children by local authorities, who are responsible for assessing their needs and supporting them. Each child will be allocated a social worker, who will draw up a care plan designed to meet their individual needs and which will be regularly reviewed. This will include an assessment of whether the child is likely to have been trafficked and an appropriate plan to minimise the risk of them going missing from care or engaging with traffickers. All looked-after children are allocated an Independent Reviewing Officer, whose role is to ensure that the child's views have been taken into account in the care plan and at review meetings.

**Lord Patten:** To ask Her Majesty's Government what steps they will take to ensure that unaccompanied children who have been trafficked into the United Kingdom are given support during any court proceedings by a legal guardian or other representative.[HL3231]

Reply from Lord Hill of Oareford: Any child subject to care proceedings in a court is entitled to have a guardian and legal representation. However, unaccompanied children who are suspected of having been trafficked into the United Kingdom would not normally be involved in court proceedings. They would be accommodated as looked after children under Section 20 of the Children Act 1989 as they would have entered the country without an adult to take parental responsibility for them.

#### **People Trafficking**

**Lord Hylton:** To ask Her Majesty's Government what action they are taking to help those states that have not yet ratified the Palermo Convention against human trafficking to ratify and implement it.[HL3448]

Reply from The Minister of State, Home Office (Baroness Neville-Jones): The UK remains fully committed to working with international partners to combat trafficking, and views the Convention against Transnational Organised Crime and the protocols thereto and the Council of Europe convention as the main instruments with which to do this.

The UK has publicly urged all states to ratify and implement these instruments with immediate effect, as they remain the principal focus of international efforts to combat human trafficking and we will continue to do so.

**Lord Hylton:** To ask Her Majesty's Government where the offices of the National Referral Mechanism and the UK Human Trafficking Centre are located; and whether they will insist on close co-operation between the two organisations and the Serious Organised Crime Agency.[HL3449]

Reply from the Minister of State, Home Office (Baroness Neville-Jones): The competent authorities responsible for making decisions under the national referral mechanism (NRM) are based within the UK Border Agency (UKBA) and the UK Human Trafficking Centre (UKHTC), which is part of the Serious Organised Crime Agency (SOCA). There has been close co-operation between all agencies since the inception of the NRM in April 2009 and we shall ensure this continues.

The NRM is an approach carried out by trained competent authorities in certain agencies and does not have separate offices.

Within UKBA the functions of the competent authority are carried out by trained caseworkers who are based in various offices in the UK as part of the regional organisation of the Border Agency. The UKHTC has been part of SOCA since 1 April 2010. SOCA has premises throughout the UK, specific details of which are not made public.

**Lord Hylton:** To ask Her Majesty's Government what is their response to the report of the report by the Anti Trafficking Monitoring Group Wrong kind of victim; and whether they will ensure that victims of trafficking have access to legal advice and redress.[HL3450]

Reply from Baroness Neville-Jones: The coalition Government do not agree with many of the findings in the Anti Trafficking Monitoring Group report Wrong Kind of Victim?, but we are considering its recommendations as part of our ongoing review of the national referral mechanism and will be acting where necessary. Identified victims of trafficking are entitled to and receive advice and information regarding their legal rights and assistance to enable their rights and interests to be presented and considered at appropriate stages of criminal justice proceedings against traffickers. There are various means by which redress can be sought. This includes prosecutors requesting compensation orders upon a conviction and through the Criminal Injuries Compensation Scheme. Victims can also seek redress from the offender through the civil courts.

**Lord Hylton:** To ask Her Majesty's Government whether they will ensure that children trafficked into Britain for exploitation in cannabis growing are not prosecuted, and do not escape from local authority care placements.[HL3451]

Reply from the Minister of State, Home Office (Baroness Neville-Jones): When police find children in cannabis farms they should follow Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPO) guidance which advises that such children should be assessed on a case by case basis to ascertain whether they may have been trafficked. Where circumstances give rise to reasonable suspicion that they are being exploited or abused, a child welfare response should be taken. No decision to progress charges against these children should be made until all relevant assessments have been undertaken.

Published guidance by the Crown Prosecution Service requires prosecutors to consider not prosecuting trafficked victims in circumstances where they committed the offence under duress, or where they were coerced into committing the offence as a direct consequence of their trafficking situation. However, there must be consideration of the extent to which the victim was compelled to undertake the unlawful activity.

Where the information concerning coercion is less certain, further details should be sought from the police and youth offender teams, so that the public interest in continuing a prosecution can be considered carefully.

Where the risks of harm to a trafficked child are serious, the accommodation for the child should minimise the risks of traffickers being able to re-involve the child in exploitative activities.

Essential safeguards should be observed in all settings in which looked after children are placed. These include carers understanding the safeguarding needs of each child; be appropriately trained and supervised; be alert to children's vulnerabilities and risks of harm and know how to implement safeguarding procedures.

**Children: Human Trafficking** 

**Peter Bone:** To ask the Secretary of State for Education what account his Department takes of the requirements of the Council of Europe Convention on Human Trafficking in determining the level of support provided to guardians of child victims of human trafficking. [21739]

**Reply from Tim Loughton:** Responsibility for the care, protection and accommodation of child trafficking victims rests with local authorities under their duty to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children, and in accordance with the Council of Europe Convention on Human Trafficking. Separated and vulnerable children from abroad have the same entitlements as UK born or resident children.

Where a child is assessed as trafficked and becomes looked after by a local authority, a social worker will be responsible for putting in place an individualised care plan covering the full range of the child's needs. The social worker will also make an assessment of the type of placement which best matches the needs of the child, including the need to safeguard them from contact with traffickers.

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# Racism and Religious Hatred

## **Westminster Parliamentary Question**

#### **Crime: Race and Criminal Justice Statistics**

**Lord Avebury:** To ask Her Majesty's Government, further to the Written Answer by Lord McNally on 22 October (*WA 205*), what the obstacle is to police forces identifying racially and religiously aggravated offences separately; and whether they will ensure that in future those data are of sufficient quality to be published in the annual Statistics on Race and the Criminal Justice System.[HL3367]

Reply from the Minister of State, Home Office (Baroness Neville-Jones): Police forces record crimes in accordance with the law and the provisions set out in the Home Office Counting Rules for Recorded Crime (HOCR). The relevant legislation (the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 as added to by the Anti-Terrorism, Crime and Security Act 2001) created a single offence of racial or religious aggravation. Police recorded crime statistics currently include racially and religiously aggravated offences as set out in law. The Home Office plans to require forces to submit more detailed information on these and other notifiable offences from April 2011 which will provide additional data to show the split between the racial and religious elements.

Police data on racially or religiously aggravated offences have been published in the *Race and the Criminal Justice System* report since 2002 and tables showing the figures for individual police force areas have been published since 2003.

Once new proposals by the Home Office are in place, The Ministry of Justice's chief statistician will be responsible for any decision concerning the inclusion of these new data in subsequent reports dependent on their quality.
