Human Trafficking

Drew Smith (Glasgow) (Scottish Labour): To ask the Scottish Executive when it last met (a) the UK Border Agency, (b) the Equality and Human Rights Commission, (c) Glasgow 2014, (d) the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service and (e) representatives of police forces to discuss human trafficking. (S4W-4356)

Reply from Kenny MacAskill: The Scottish Government works in partnership with the UK Government and other agencies to ensure that effective measures are taken to combat this form of serious organised crime. Meetings with our key partners are held on a regular basis.

Immigration and Asylum Holyrood Parliamentary Question (continued)

The Scottish Government last met with the UK Border Agency on 21 November 2011 and a further meeting will take place on 16 December 2011. Scottish Government officials met with the Equality and Human Rights Commission on 25 October 2011. The Commonwealth Games Security Committee, which includes representatives from the Scottish Government, met on 27 October 2011. A meeting was held with the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service on 27 September 2011. A meeting was held with the Scottish Crime and Drug Enforcement Agency on 14 September 2011 and a meeting will be held with the Association of Chief Police Officers in Scotland on 9 December 2011.

Westminster Parliamentary Questions

Immigrants: Citizenship

Frank Field: To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department how many immigrants to the UK have successfully applied for UK citizenship in each of the last 10 years; and if she will make a statement. [86561]

Reply from Damian Green: The available statistics are given in the following table. It is not possible to identify separately grants of British citizenship made to migrants as opposed to those that are UK born within the published data.

The number of applications for and grants of British citizenship has risen significantly since the mid-1990s. This increase is likely, in part, to reflect increased grants of settlement over the same period to non-European economic area nationals—after a period of residence those granted settlement become eligible to apply for citizenship.

The latest Home Office immigration statistics on persons granted British citizenship, from which the data in this reply are derived, are given in table 'cz.02' of the statistical release 'Immigration Statistics July-September 2011'. Asylum

Richard Graham: To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department in how many of the asylum legacy cases resolved since May 2010 an individual was *(a)* granted asylum and *(b)* deported. [85031]

Reply from Damian Green: In answering this question, I have taken deportation to mean removal. Since May 2010, it is not a national statistic, and as such, it should be treated as provisional and therefore subject to change, 280 individuals have been granted asylum and 400 have been removed.

Richard Graham: To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department how many asylum legacy cases are outstanding; and how many such cases have been concluded in the last 12 months. [85032]

Reply from Damian Green: The UK Border Agency committed to review all older unresolved cases by summer 2011; this was achieved by March 2011. A total of 500,500 cases were reviewed as part of the programme.

As Jonathan Sedgwick, then acting chief executive of the UK Border Agency reported to the Home Affairs Committee on 12 September, 479,000 of the 500,500 cases in the legacy programme have been fully concluded.

During the period 1 December 2010 to 12 September 2011, 41,950 cases reached conclusion, 15,499 asylum legacy cases remain outstanding.

Jeremy Corbyn: To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department how many children under 16 years are being held in detention for immigration purposes; and how many were being held in *(a)* May 2011, *(b)* January 2011 and *(c)* June 2010. [77052]

Reply from Damian Green: The latest published management information for the number of children under 16 years of age entering detention, held solely under Immigration Act powers in immigration removal centres, short term holding facilities and pre departure accommodation at Cedars is six in October 2011; seven in May 2011; two in January 2011 and 26 in June 2010.

This information is a subset of published data that corresponds closest to the dates requested. These figures exclude those detained in police cells, Prison Service establishments and short-term holding rooms at ports and airports (for less than 24 hours), those recorded as detained under both criminal and immigration powers and their dependants. They may include age disputed cases. Cedars pre departure accommodation for families opened on 17 August 2011.

Reply from Angela Constance: The Modern Apprenticeship Programme is a fully employed programme in Scotland and as a result recruitment decisions are in the hands of participating employers. We are committed to ensure that we improve the uptake by individuals of black and ethnic minority communities. The best way for us to achieve this is through the careers advice and guidance services offered to individuals and raising awareness among employers.

In 2010 Skills Development Scotland provided funding to the STUC to undertake a project to promote the apprenticeship programme to trade unions and employers. Part of this project looked at improving the awareness of trade unions about the need to work with employers to promote the recruitment of individuals from a diverse range of backgrounds when undertaking apprenticeship recruitment processes.

S4M-01600 Kezia Dugdale: 20th Anniversary of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child—That the Parliament notes that 16 December 2011 marks the 20th anniversary of the UK's ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child; considers it important to ensure that children's rights underpin all legislation, policy and practice affecting children and young people to ensure that every child is able to develop to his or her full potential; notes the progress that has been made over the last 20 years to bring children's rights into the mainstream in Scotland, but also the significant challenges that remain; acknowledges the proposals from the Scottish Government to give statutory force to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child in Scots law, and calls on the Scottish Government to ensure that it does its utmost to fulfil its human rights obligations to children and that every child in Scotland, regardless of background or circumstances, is able to access and enjoy all the rights set out in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.
