#### **Asylum Seekers**

**Linda Fabiani:** To ask the Scottish Government, further to the answer to question S3W-33599 by Michael Russell on 27 May 2010, whether (a) detention of children in Dungavel Immigration Removal Centre, (b) the transfer of children of asylum seekers from Scotland to detention elsewhere in the UK and (c) dawn raids in Scotland has/have ended. (S4W-9801)

**Reply from Aileen Campbell:** The Scottish Government does not hold the information requested due to this being a reserved matter and therefore for the UK Government to respond to.

The Scottish Government continues to be opposed to the detention of children for immigration purposes. My officials will continue to monitor how the new family returns process is affecting asylum seeking families in Scotland and I await the outcomes of the findings on the evaluation of this policy by the UK Government.

#### **Entry Clearances: Overseas Students**

**Nic Dakin:** To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department what steps her Department is taking to help international students affected by the removal of the licence to teach international students at their places of study find new places to study and to provide funding for their studies. [121321]

**Reply from Mark Harper**: The UK Border Agency (UKBA) acts in line with the Tier 4 sponsor guidance which states if it believes that students were actively involved (complicit) in the circumstances which led to the licence being revoked, they immediately cancel their permission to stay in the UK and the student has to leave the UK or face enforced removal.

If UKBA believes that students were not actively involved in the circumstances which led to the licence being revoked, they will generally reduce (curtail) the student's permission to stay in the UK to 60 calendar days. This enables students to find new places to study. UKBA will, however, consider the individual circumstances of the student before reaching a decision on curtailment.

If a student has less than 60 days' permission left, UKBA will not curtail it. If they have not found a new sponsor when their permission expires they will have to leave the UK or face enforced removal.

**Joan Walley:** To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department what proportion of applications for visas from overseas students in higher education assessed by the UK Border Agency was successful in *(a)* 2009-10, *(b)* 2010-11, *(c)* 2011-12 and *(d)* 2012-13 to date; and if she will make a statement. [121820]

**Reply from Mark Harper:** The UK Border Agency's published data do not distinguish between higher education students and all other students. To provide an accurate answer to the question tabled would require the examination of individual records, which would incur disproportionate costs. The Secretary of State for the Home Department, my right hon. Friend the Member for Maidenhead (Mrs May), will not make a statement on this issue.

**John Spellar:** To ask the Secretary of State for the Home Department how many legacy asylum cases are currently held by the UK Border Agency. [122053]

**Reply from Mark Harper:** As of 30 June 2012 there were 25,500 live legacy asylum cases and 74,000 cases in the asylum controlled archive (rounded to the nearest 500).

The Case Assurance and Audit Unit (CAAU) will continue to manage the cases taking robust action to trace applicants and conclude cases where new information comes to light which allows cases to be progressed. All the cases in the asylum controlled archive will either have been moved to the live cohort for caseworking or closed by the end of 2012.

#### **Human Trafficking**

Lord Patten: To ask Her Majesty's Government what is their assessment of the number of girls and women trafficked into the United Kingdom by gangs operating in Turkey.[HL2327]

Reply from the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State, Home Office (Lord Taylor of Holbeach): The hidden nature of the trafficking trade and the fact that it is not always possible to confirm whether an individual has been trafficked means it is difficult to make an assessment. The National Referral Mechanism (NRM) was set up in 2009 to identify and support potential victims of human trafficking referred to it. Since 2009 two Turkish females have been referred. The data do not record whether they were trafficked by gangs operating in Turkey. All published NRM data are available on the UK Human Trafficking Centre (UKHTC) portion of the SOCA website; <u>http://www.soca.gov.uk/about-soca/about-the-ukhtc/national-referral-mechanism/statistics</u>.

#### Human Trafficking

**Peter Bone:** To ask the Attorney-General how many prosecutions took place for conspiracy to traffic human beings in each of the last three years; and how many such prosecutions led to convictions. [122783]

**Reply from the Solicitor-General:** I am unable to provide data on the number of defendants prosecuted and who were convicted for conspiracy to traffic human beings. The Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) Case Management System cannot disaggregate from figures for all offences of conspiracy under section 1 of the Criminal Law Act 1977, the specific type of offence which they conspired to commit. These data could be obtained only by examining all of the CPS's case files for conspiracy, which would incur disproportionate cost.

#### Human Trafficking

**Peter Bone:** To ask the Attorney-General what his policy is on prosecutions in criminal cases relating to human trafficking. [123676]

**Reply from the Solicitor-General:** The Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) published a Public Policy Statement for Prosecuting Cases of Human Trafficking in June 2011. This policy statement emphasises that the CPS considers organised human trafficking to be a very serious crime and prosecutors will do whatever possible to disrupt and combat trafficking, including bringing successful prosecutions. The policy statement explains the way in which the CPS deal with cases of human trafficking and the wide range of other crime associated with it. In addition, the statement is supported by more detailed legal guidance for CPS prosecutors providing up-to-date guidance on the range of criminal offences associated with trafficking, supporting trafficked victims and case management issues.

### **Westminster Parliamentary Questions**

Labour Market Trends (Black and Minority Ethnic Communities) Heidi Alexander: What recent assessment she has made of the effects of recent labour market trends on black and minority ethnic communities. [123198]

**Reply from the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Women and Equalities (Helen Grant):** Tackling unemployment is a priority for this Government. Our approach is to support according to individual need rather than to segregate according to ethnic group. On the matter of need, Mr Speaker, would you allow me to pay tribute to the fact that today is anti-slavery day?

**Heidi** Alexander: Yesterday, the TUC published a report that showed that the unemployment rate among young black men stands at 50%, and that that group has experienced the sharpest rise in unemployment since the Minister's Government came to power. Does she recognise the devastating impact that her Government's failure to get the economy moving is having on the lives of those young men? What specific action will she take to tackle the problem?

**Reply from Helen Grant:** I do not accept the accuracy of the figures the hon. Lady mentions, but I accept that the figures on young black men and employment are bad, and that they need to improve. A number of the figures given fail to classify those in full-time education, but it would be wrong to assume that someone needs additional support simply because of the colour of their skin. Notwithstanding that, the Government are giving a range of tailored support, through Jobcentre Plus, the fantastic Work programme, the Youth Contract and all our measures to get Britain working. We should not stereotype people according to ethnic groups—everyone needs help.

**Peter Bottomley:** I welcome my hon. Friend to her responsibilities. As part of the task of ensuring that the colour of someone's skin is no more important than the colour of their eyes or hair, will she encourage her colleagues in the Government to promote vocational qualifications and achievements in education, so that people can be chosen on their merit and qualities rather than be disqualified because of prejudice or stereotypes?

**Reply from Helen Grant:** My hon. Friend makes a good point. The one-size-fitsall approach to unemployment has clearly failed. We need local providers to deliver good, innovative local services. We should be pleased that, in 2010-11, the highest number of black and minority ethnic apprentices started their training. Michael Gove's reforms will be key to that, and I very much look forward to seeing them coming to fruition.

An historic accord that paves the way for a referendum on an independent Scotland was signed in Edinburgh today, after First Minister Alex Salmond reached an agreement with the Prime Minister David Cameron that will confirm the Scottish Parliament's power to hold a vote that will be respected fully by both governments. ...

The agreement will see a Section 30 order laid in the Scottish Parliament and at Westminster to confirm Holyrood has the power necessary for a single question referendum, ensuring that the 2014 vote will be designed and run by the people of Scotland. After the order has been agreed, the Scottish Government will bring forward legislation to Parliament to enable the referendum to be run. This will set out the proposed date, franchise, the wording of the question, rules on campaign finance and other rules governing the conduct of the campaign.

# **Ministerial Statement**

#### Referendum (Scotland)

The Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Scotland (David Mundell): ... I am pleased to report to the House that today in Edinburgh the Prime Minister and the First Minister have made an agreement that will allow a legal, fair and decisive referendum to take place.

This is a significant agreement. The two Governments have agreed that there should be a referendum. We have agreed that the referendum will consist of a single question. It will offer a choice between remaining within the United Kingdom and independence. We have agreed that it must be held before the end of 2014. The referendum will be based on the normal legal framework for UK referendums, with oversight from the Electoral Commission. That includes the key issues of how the referendum question will be determined, and how the rules governing spending and campaigning will be established. Following today's agreement, the Government will bring forward an Order in Council under section 30 of the Scotland Act 1998. I have today placed a copy of the agreement and the draft order in the Library of the House. The agreement and draft order are also available to Members from the Vote Office. The order will be laid before Parliament on 22

October and will be debated by both Houses of this Parliament and by the Scottish Parliament. All Members of this House will have the opportunity to consider and vote on the order. If both Parliaments approve the order, and after it is approved by Her Majesty in Council, the Scottish Parliament will have the legal competence to legislate for the referendum. We hope that the order will be passed by February 2013. Once that has happened, the Scottish Government will introduce a referendum Bill, setting out the wording of the question, the date of the referendum and the rules for the campaign for the Scottish Parliament to consider. ...
